

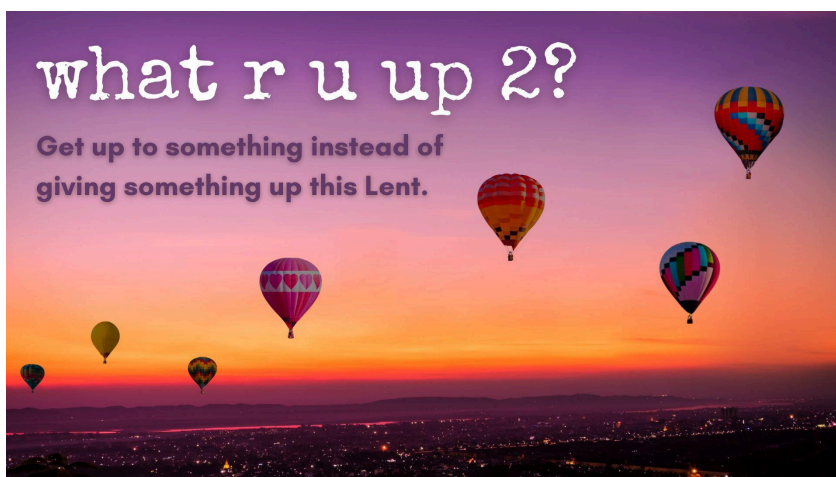

"You Raise Me Up"

Make no mistake, the powers-that-be in Jerusalem sat up and took notice of the actions of Jesus and his motley crew of palm-waving followers on that morning. It was a show of the "power" of love and injustice for the "least of these," in stark juxtaposition to the military might of the Roman rulers. It was a nonviolent action featuring a man sitting on a donkey — an action that has offered hope throughout the ages. Will we sit up and take notice of the injustice of this world and work to eradicate it in ways that honor that first Palm Sunday parade?

Let us pray together:

Peace-loving God, our first instinct in fighting oppression
is often to take up weapons, utter fighting words, and lash out with vitriol.
But Jesus demonstrated humility and patience, even against his mortal enemies.
In this moment of quiet, we lift up to you those things we'd like to give up for good...
for the sake of The Good.

Meditative Moment

Hear assurance in what the Psalmist proclaims:

O give thanks to the Lord, for God is good; God's steadfast love endures forever! Let Israel say,
"God's steadfast love endures forever." . . . Open to me the gates of righteousness, that I may enter
through them and give thanks to the Lord. This is the gate of the Lord; the righteous shall enter
through it. I thank you that you have answered me and have become my salvation. The stone that
the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone. . . . Blessed is the one who comes in the
name of the Lord. We bless you from the house of the Lord. The Lord is God, and God has given us
light. Bind the festal procession with branches, up to the horns of the altar. You are my God, and I
will give thanks to you; you are my God; I will extol you. O give thanks to the Lord, for God is good,
for God's steadfast love endures forever. (Psalm 118, excerpts)

We are watching, O God, for signs of your gentle presence in the midst of insurmountable systems of oppression. We remember the story of Jesus entering Jerusalem on a donkey as a symbol of hope that endures in this age of violence. Especially in these times of heightened anxiety and fear, we pray that we can be “up to something good” for ourselves, our neighborhoods, and our world. And so this week we start with thanksgiving for these acts of uplifting goodness:
